Lullay, As I lay – a medieval English carol

SATB unaccompanied



The melody and words for the burden (chorus) and first verse of this ancient carol can be found in the Appendix to *Musica Britannica vol IV ed. Stevens (p.110)*. It appears in a document dating from the first quarter of the 15th century, and is likely to be considerably earlier.

Further research unearthed some supporting verses which fill out the story of the vision of Mother and Child, but the musical arrangement is an entirely new one. It tries to echo the harmonies which would have prevailed at the time while still making the carol accessible to modern choirs and audiences. The lilting triple-time is typical of the late medieval period.
